

### Holy Club - Methodist

To understand about Methodist, and before we talk about Doctrine, Spirit, and Discipline, we should know where the name "Methodist" came from.

John Wesley's spiritual life was influenced by his mother, Susanna Wesley. Susanna's education was very strict. Susanna disciplined her children to keep the routines. Susanna checked what the children had learned and remembered before mealtime. Susanna disciplined the children not only in studying but also in various areas, such as eating and behavior. This discipline of Susanna affected Wesley to form his spiritual lifestyle.



After Wesley became a fellow at Oxford, he went back to his hometown to help his father's ministry. While John was in his hometown, his brother, Charles Wesley, entered Oxford. At this time, Charles founded a small gathering with his two friends for spiritual discipline and studies about God and faith. After John Wesley came back to Oxford from his hometown, Charles and his two friends invited him to be the leader of this gathering. They named this gathering "Holy Club," and this was the start of Methodist.


John Wesley's strict spiritual discipline affected this Holy Club. It was not the club just sharing their story, checking in on each other's lives. They hardly trained their spiritual lifestyle like sports players in this present day. Just as athletes make detailed plans and execute how much weight to lift today and how much to lift tomorrow, what to eat today, and what training to do tomorrow for their body and performance during the game, Wesley and Holy Club members make their own plans, and prepared a specific list and rules for spirituality and tried to stick to them. They had some list to do. Pray every morning, read the Bible and spiritual readings, receive Communion every week, fast every Wednesday and Friday, visit prisoners, etc.

We could know that Wesley named this gathering as Holy Club, so why do we call us "Methodist"? Holy Club had a very strict schedule for their spirituality. However, they seriously devoted their lives to keeping those rules and schedules that they set up. So, people around the Holy Club members started to mock Holy Club members as "Methodist." The word "Methodist" came from a group of doctors when Emperor Nero ruled the Roman Empire. Those doctors believed that all illnesses could be cured if a person lived a well-scheduled and ordered life and ate healthy foods. Those doctors were called, "Methodist" at that time. Wesley liked the name "Methodist." He believed the Holy Club could be called Methodist because they followed the schedules and rules for God well.

If the Holy Club just pursued what to do, they would be legalist. However, Wesley had an obvious purpose and direction in doing all the disciplines. The purpose was to be a Perfect Christian, and the way to be a Perfect Christian was "Doctrine, Spirit, and Discipline." This was why Wesley was afraid of losing "Doctrine, Spirit, and Discipline." If the Methodists lose those three things, we lose our fundamental purpose and the way of our spiritual life. So, in the next few months, I hope to talk more about what a Perfect Christian is and about our Doctrine.





We continue to place eyeglass containers in businesses (it brings them new customers). We are now receiving glasses from Viroqua, Westby, Cashton, Coon Valley, Chaseburg, Readstown, Soldiers Grove, Mt Sterling, Retreat, New Hope and DeSoto. This project is accomplished 7 days a week in order to achieve our goal of 15, 103 used eyeglasses. Thank your for 2024

All glasses are taken to the Wisconsin Eyeglass Collection Center in Roholt, Wisconsin to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation. There they are sorted and inspected for scratches. They are read for their prescription and filed into their appropriate boxes. Broken metal frames are sent out for their metal value. All these glasses are used during our mission trips for distribution to those that need them after a proper screening to determine the prescription they need.
